

Response to NTA documents

We, the Rathfarnham Castle Residents Association (RCRA) committee, represent the residents of Castleside Drive, a quiet area immediately adjoining Rathfarnham Castle Park. We wish to take this opportunity to confirm our objection to the proposed compulsory acquisition of a large strip of the Woodland area of the Park, which is an extremely important amenity for the area.

The NTA response documents make it abundantly clear that the importance and value of the Woodland area, as well as the Park as a whole, are still entirely unappreciated by them. The Park is quite small in size but very valued in the local area. The Woodland is a quiet haven which contains a lovely playground. There is an immediately adjoining duck pond which is a habitat for numerous protected wintering birds. An open watercourse, the river, runs through the area.

The NTA have belatedly acknowledged the existence of this habitat, of which they had clearly previously been unaware. We note their admission that:

"Rathfarnham Castle Park has not previously been identified as an ex-situ site for Special Conservation Interest wintering birds, but does nonetheless support wintering birds such as ducks, moorhens and some SCI gulls." [NTA Planning Response pg 93]

We also note that:

"In relation to breeding birds there is a likely significant residual effect at the local geographic scale (habitat loss, disturbance / displacement)" there will be a "significant negative effect on the conservation status of breeding birds at the local geographic scale". [NTA CPO Response pgs 65 / 66]

As the Park is so small, construction work at the Woodland area will cause major upheaval throughout the Park, particularly in terms of noise and vibration from pile driving etc. This is likely to decimate the breeding populations of wildlife throughout the Park. It is accepted that this impact will be very significant within 250m of the construction site:

"All areas within 250m of the Proposed Scheme will be subject to construction activities which generate noise levels greater than 50dB (e.g. piling, rock-breaking, etc.) These activities will result in a greater magnitude of effect on the baseline environment. As a result, noise and vibration from these activities, will have the potential to result in the reduced breeding success of breeding bird species in the vicinity of the works...." [Planning Report pg 445, extracted from Ch 12 EIAR].

However, the duck pond is only around 60 – 70 metres from the current Park boundary. The entire Park is effectively located within 250m of the boundary wall. Therefore, the proposed works will have an extremely significant negative impact on the Park as a whole.

We agree with the Rathfarnham Wood Residents' Association proposed approach – that the bus corridor should instead be terminated at the Rathfarnham Village by-pass (at the junction with Butterfield Avenue). A signal controlled priority light at this location could give priority to outbound buses without incurring extremely high costs in monetary and environmental terms. The current, and correct, approach within the EU and elsewhere is to preserve and restore natural green areas. It is certainly not to cut down a vibrant woodland habitat, and to effectively destroy a breeding habitat of protected species, where a suitable alternative approach exists.

Again, the Park is a vital amenity for the area and local community and should be protected, not destroyed. Bus priority for outbound buses at this small stretch of road could instead be achieved by using bus priority signals. There is already an inbound bus lane. Please consider the extremely significant negative impacts on the entirety of Rathfarnham Castle Park, not just its Woodland, before proceeding with this proposal.

It appears to us that the transport benefits would be greatly outweighed by the cost and environmental impact.
