

To whom it may concern,

I wish to make an observation on the above appeal. Please find my comments below.

1. Project splitting & Undisclosure of full project extent

It is claimed by the developer that the 6 wind turbines under appeal here will be the only wind farm facilitated by the substation, also under appeal, in Barnadivane. Yet in October 2015 as part of Further Information Requests from the Bord in relation to appeal ref. no. PL04.243486 (Shehymore wind farm) and appeal ref. no. PL04.244439 (Barnadivane substation) the grid connection route from Shehymore to Barnadivane substation was revealed, though the

planning process for that particular wind farm has been ongoing since 2013 and the substation in parnadivane has been in the planning system since 2014. Both have gone through Cork County Council planning department with the benefit of pre-planning meetings and this crucial connection was not in the public domain. This means 12 further wind turbines are looking to connect to the substation in Barnadivane. We can now add a further 5 wind turbines to this total as on the 22nd Dec 2015 Keel Energy Ltd lodged a planning application to Cork County Council, this proposed wind farm to connect to the grid via the grid connection route to Barnadivane substation.

Conclusion:

As the developing company in the case of all 3 wind farms, substation and grid connection route are sister companies, owned and backed by the same people, it requires the question to be asked of Cork County Council, who are having pre planning consultations with this/ these developer/s, what exactly is going on in this region of Cork County? All these projects are connected through the substation and therefore should be treated as one project and yet the public is finding out in a piecemeal way about them and this hampers and inhibits their ability to constructively assess what the implications are for their families, livelihoods and quality of life. The latest application by Keel Energy actually has the connection to the grid via the grid connection route currently under appeal as part of its application to Cork County Council. Where is the logic in this? What if this route is refused planning permission? The Bord cannot allow the planning system to be used in this manner as it is neither fair nor transparent.

2. Animal welfare and local amenities

I have a part share in a race horse which uses land adjoining this proposed wind farm. The boundary ditch is about 100m from the nearest wind turbine. It is well known that horses are very sensitive to the sound of wind turbines. I will not be able to keep this horse here if the wind farm goes ahead. This will directly affect the amenity value of the area where I live and therefore my quality of life. Why should my rights as a person in my neighborhood be subservient to faceless developers who have no interest in respecting my rights in my own

3. Landowner Consent

Is the Bord satisfied that the consents provided by the landowners are the consents of all those who are named owners of the said properties?

4. Flooding

It has been reported in the media and on AA Roadwatch today, 30 Dec 2015, that flooding has AN BORD PLEANÁLA

taken place from Bengour West to Beal na Blath with severe flooding in Crookstown village buding to the road being closed in various stretches along the route. This is the river Bride which runs along the southern boundary of this wind farm. Are the Bord happy that this development will not add or increase the potential in any way for an increase in run off from this sloping site? It is incumbent on Cork County Council to protect people and the environment from flooding. There have been several road fatalities in the country this Christmas as a direct result of flooding and I feel that economic concerns should not supersede the value of human life.

The same area was already flooded earlier in the month and I now offer this as proof that the area has always been prone to flooding contrary to what has been stated by the applicants. The applicants only carried out a desktop survey and a very uncomprehensive one at that, and yet again failed to seek local knowledge


5. White tailed sea eagle

A white tailed sea eagle has been seen in the Gearagh nature reserve today and yesterday 29-30 Dec 2015. It is blue tagged and reported on http://www.irishbirding.com/birds/web? task=BasicBirdSightingSearch.

The bird was seen by Mr. Aidan Duggan on the 29th and seen and photographed by Mr. John Lynch on the 30th Dec. Both men are highly respected and very well-known birders from Cork. The importance in the future for the Gearagh and it's surrounds for the breeding and the survival of the white tailed sea eagle project cannot be overestimated and will if successful be a huge boost for the Lee Valley.

Many people are working desperately to reinvigorate the Lee Valley and it's hinterlands since its almost total annihilation by a previous electrical power project, namely, the Carrigadrohid and Inniscarra hydro electrical dams. The project came at a huge environmental and human cost. One project is trying to create workable fish passes at the dams for salmon and eels. When completed these fish will help restore both the natural environment (freshwater pearl mussels need salmonids to complete their life cycle and these fish will provide food for eagles and ospreys) and the human environment by bringing back game fishing for which the upper lee was famous and providing a tourist attraction with the presence of one of the world's largest birds.

As Cork already provides more than its fair share of wind and hydro generated power to the grid, and that new technology will see turbines move off shore and other less damaging technologies develop, I plead that the Bord look at the long term consequences for the area and take an holistic approach that respects all and to not vote for short term gains.



6. Bat Roosts

As has already been said, no attempt has been made with local residents to establish if they have bat roosts on their property. Therefore I enclose a list of people who live on the perimeter of the site, all of whom have already objected to the development, who state that they have a/several bat roosts on their property and feel consequently that a proper study of the bat ecology of the area was not carried out. All of these people have serious concerns for their bats due to potential for collision with turbines, barotrauma and habitat displacement. The list of names is, Denis Buckley, Patrick Manning, Dan Galvin and Michael O'Donovan.
