4m high bund to soften the impact of noise from M1 with additional woodland planting softening the views from the south and west while connecting to adjacent wildlife corridors.

The Henge Feature mounding to express Bronze Age archaeology, distinctive destination and strong identity for the park

Boyne Valley Park

Neighbourhood area for play designed to make the most of the levels

Pedestrian path connects across the road and to the Boyne River walk, located in an existing clearing

Mary McAleese Park
Geometric zigzag landforms mimic the geometry of the bridge providing places to play and lounge on. These wrap around spaces for play and exercise to the NW. Informal paths and bridges cut through the park and bridge over the swales at regular intervals.

Coursed limestone gabion retaining walls, native woodland planting, and meadow create a distinctive but subtle sense of arrival while complementing the surrounding landscape character

Sheephouse Green:
A contemporary local play space for climbing, socializing and relaxing

The Cut
The Cut is a pedestrian priority space with angular lines, play forms, and regular, sharp terraced landforms.

Rathmullan Central Square:
Contemporary community plaza and meeting place, adjacent to the creche and communal garden

Rathmullan Green:
Contemporary rectilinear space with a north-south orientation/MUGA, swathes of color planting and places to watch the world go by. Square with shared surface; connects the creche with the park.
