My home is a two minute walk to the entrance of the road leading to the proposed quarry in Raphoe. I pass this road two to three daily whilst walking my dog and to date I have never at any time seen a planning permission notice regarding the reopening of the quarry.

Raphoe is a Heritage town and we welcome visitors. Having a working quarry in the middle of the town will undoubtedly affect tourism and local businesses. Oakfield Park which is one of the main attractions to Raphoe is very close to the proposed quarry.

There is a Secondary school a very short distance from the proposed quarry and the noise and health implication for the pupils are very concerning.

Unfortunatly as with the rest of Donegal we have a large number of mica homes and most of these are built in close proximity to the proposed quarry.
