

Screggan Bog NHA (000921)	7.8 km northwest	<ul> <li>Peatlands [4]</li> <li>Raised bog comprised of both high bog and cutover bog.</li> <li>Much of the bog is quite dry due to drainage and peatcutting at the margin.</li> <li>Extensive colonisation of its southeast portion by Scots Pine (<i>Pinus sylvestris</i>).</li> <li>Large areas of coniferous forestry, deciduous woodland and scrub also present.</li> <li>Largely comprised of bog mosses (<i>Sphagnum</i> spp.) including two notable hummock-forming species <i>S. imbricatum</i> and <i>S. fuscum</i>.</li> <li>Red Data Book species, Alder Buckthorn (<i>Frangula alnus</i>) and Bird Cherry (<i>Prunus padus</i>).</li> <li>Peat-cutting, agriculture and forestry have resulted in loss of habitat, damage to the hydrological status of the site, and pose a continuing threat to its viability.</li> </ul>
Hawkswood Bog NHA (002355)	7.0 km north	<ul> <li>Peatlands [4]</li> <li>Raised bog that includes both areas of high bog and cutover bog.</li> <li>The high bog has pools present and is still wet and quaking in places with very little drainage and no forestry.</li> <li>Cutover is found all around the high bog margins.</li> <li>Current landuses on the site include peat-cutting, agriculture and forestry.</li> <li>There appears to be very little peat-cutting, with only limited domestic peat-cutting to the south and south-west, but otherwise there is little damaging operations.</li> <li>Damaging activities associated with these landuses include burning of the high bog and drainage at the bog margins. These activities have resulted in the loss of habitat, damage to the hydrological status of the site, and pose a continuing threat to its viability.</li> </ul>
Slieve Bloom Mountains pNHA (000412)	1 km south	<ul> <li>Old red sandstone mountains, mountain blanket bog, Peregrine Falcon, Hen harrier, red grouse.</li> </ul>
Pallas Lough pNHA (000916)	8.6 km northwest	<ul> <li>Significant numbers of wildfowl and waders use the lake. The reed swamp fringes and centre provide cover and make ideal nesting areas for ducks such as Mallard, Teal and Widgeon. The peripheral wet grassland is grazed in the winter by geese. The rare Marsh Harrier has recently been seen hunting in the area.</li> <li>This area is of botanical interest due to the diversity of plant habitats and the species richness of those habitats.</li> </ul>
Raheen Lough pNHA (000917)	15.8 km	<ul> <li>Main interest lies in the variety and numbers of wildfowl and waders that this pNHA attracts. It has a particularly important role because open waterbodies are infrequent in the area.</li> <li>Apart from the open water, the level wet pasture is much used by feeding birds, and in some places has typical marshland vegetation.</li> <li>Species that use this site include swans, including Whooper Swans, diving ducks, including Goldeneye and Pochard, dabbling ducks, mainly Mallard but including Shoveler and Pintail, waders including Greenshank, Jack Snipe, and Purple Sandpipers, and other species such as Heron, Kingfisher and Grebes.</li> <li>The site is of at least local importance on ornithological grounds.</li> </ul>
Clonad Wood pNHA (000574)	7 km northeast	<ul> <li>Deciduous woodland on low-lying agricultral land bordering the Clodiagh River.</li> <li>The wood is dominated by Pedunculate Oak (<i>Quercus robur</i>) which has been underplanted with Beech (<i>Fagus sylvatica</i>) and conifers.</li> </ul>

		<ul> <li>The rare Alder Buckthorn (<i>Frangula alnus</i>) and Bird Cherry (<i>Prunus padus</i>) are found in the woodland, while Irish Whitebeam (<i>Sorbus hibernica</i>) is also abundant.</li> </ul>
Grand Canal pNHA (002104)	13.5 km north	<ul> <li>Man-made waterway linking the River Liffey at Dublin with the Shannon at Shannon Harbour and the Barrow at Athy.</li> </ul>
		Comprises the canal channel and the banks on either side of it.
		<ul> <li>A number of different habitats are found within the canal boundaries - hedgerow, tall herbs, calcareous grassland, reed fringe, open water, scrub and woodland.</li> </ul>
		• The diversity of the water channel is particularly high in the eastern section of the Main Line - between the Summit level at Lowtown and Inchicore. Arrowhead ( <i>Sagittaria sagittifolia</i> ) and Water-cress ( <i>Rorippa nasturtium-aquaticum</i> ) are more common in this stretch than on the rest of the system.
		• The rare and legally protected Opposite-leaved Pondweed ( <i>Groenlandia densa</i> ) is present at a number of sites in the eastern section of the Main Line, between Lowtown and Ringsend Basin in Dublin.
		• The ecological value of the canal lies more in the diversity of species it supports along its linear habitats than in the presence of rare species.
Charleville Wood pNHA (000571)	10.3 km north	<ul> <li>The site has a large population of the rare snail species, Desmoulin's whorl snail (Vertigo moulinsiana).</li> </ul>
		<ul> <li>This site is one of the most important ancient woodland sites in Ireland. The woodland has a varied age structure and is relatively intact with areas of both closed and open canopy.</li> </ul>
Slieve Bloom Mountains	4 km southwest	The largest and most intact area of mountain blanket bog in Ireland.
Ramsar Site (335)		<ul> <li>Well-developed hummock, hollow and pool systems.</li> <li>Vegetation consists of dwarf shrub, herb layer and extensive cover of</li> </ul>
		Sphagnum moss.
		<ul> <li>The Site supports a range of breeding birds, insects and mammals along with frogs, lizards and smooth newts.</li> </ul>
		• Together with its surrounding habitats, it is one of Ireland's most important sites for the rare breeding hen harrier ( <i>Circus cyaneus</i> ).
		<ul> <li>Other raptor species recorded are peregrine falcon (<i>Falco peregrinus</i>) and merlin (<i>Falco columbarius</i>), while another emblematic bird is the red grouse (<i>Lagopus lagopus</i>).</li> </ul>
Slieve Bloom Mountains	5 km southwest	Managed to conserve the mountain blanket bog ecosystem.
Nature Reserve		Also designated as a Ramsar Wetland Site and a Council of Europe Biogenetic Reserve.
		Hen harrier and red grouse nest on the blanket bog and heath.
		<ul> <li>Meadow pipis, skylarks, snow buntings, merlin, peregrine, falcon, raven, snipe, golden plover, lapwing, curlew, wheatear and ring ouzel can also be found in the reserve.</li> </ul>
