A Chara,

We wish to refer a decision made by Galway City Council in relation to a Declaration of Exemption application for the provision of a sculpture on the Atlantic Technological University (ATU) Galway City campus grounds. (Appendix A)

Also find enclosed fee of €220 (R1).

As a brief background, the sculpture piece, called' "Megalithic Memories" (1900 mm High / 3000 mm Long / 1450 mm Wide) was created in 1981 by renowned sculptor John Behan, was commissioned by an architect in 1981 and has been on display in the AIB Dublin collection since that date. It has now been donated to ATU by AIB. (Appendix B)

Further to the Council's rejection of our Declaration of Exemption application, it is the view of ATU that this sculpture is exempted development under the Planning and Development Regulations 2001-2024, Schedule 2, Part 1, Class 36:

#### CLASS 36

(a) Development consisting of the carrying out by or on behalf of a State authority or other <u>public body</u>, on land used by the authority or body as a public park, of works incidental to that use, including the provision, construction or erection of any structure in connection with or for the purposes of the enjoyment of the park or which is required in connection with or for the purposes of the management or operation of the park.

The grounds within ATU are specifically defined as "Institutional Open Space", providing open / unfettered access to the wider public, as defined within the Galway City Council's 'Open spaces within the Green Network' hierarchy list, set out in Table 5.2 of the Galway City Development Plan 2023-2029. ATU deems that the term 'park' has been applied too narrowly applied by the planning authority in this case and does not reflect the broader 'public open space' definition set out in their own development plan. According to the Oxford dictionary, the term 'park' is defined as "an area of public land in a town or a city where people [can] go to walk, play and relax." Alternatively defined as "an area of public property maintained in its natural state; and/or a tract of land that can include lawns which is accessible to the public." The grounds of ATU fulfil this definition.

The Bord's determination of this appeal is extremely important, as it will have a bearing on further art installations proposed throughout ATU's eight campuses in Galway, Mayo, Sligo and Donegal, and other 'parks' controlled by educational institutions throughout Ireland.

in the context of NPF growth largets for the city, the Council will continue to acquire lands zoned for recreation and amenity use or other lands with potential to smance the quality of the green network, support connectivity, climate residence and to provide additional sports and recreation facilities. Initiatives including the "Healthy Green Spaces", "Green Flags for Parks" and "Greening of the Laneways" will be progressed in conjunction with local communities, schools and voluntary groups to enable the development of amon'ty spaces and support biodiversity. Opportunities for public/private partnerships will also be investigated where a high standard of recreation facety can be developed, including with public access.

The green network plays an important role in sport and physical activity. The Wational Sparts Policy 2018 • 2027 and National Physical Activity Plan (2021) sets targets and actions for increasing participation in sport for all ages and abilities. Existing and proposed active recreation facilities such as playing pitches. MUGAs, ball walls, tenns courts and running tracks are important facilities located within the green network which contribute to healthies litestyles and social and community interaction. The review of the RANS will inform additional requirements for such facilities.

The Galway Sports Partnership also has an important role in increasing participation in sport dedivoring programmes of activity, training and education opportunities and raising awareness. A range of clubs and leisure providers also help improve facilities and increase participation.
